What can I do?

1. CO detectors


- Install CO detectors in the hallway of every sleeping area
- Test CO detectors frequently (ex. every month)

2. Annual heating system inspection by certified technician

• Properly install and maintain heating systems (including furnaces, chimneys, and vents)

3. Practice CO safety

- Operate portable generators at least 20 ft outside the house
- Do not leave automobiles running in open or enclosed garage
